Rules And Regulations

- 1. All exhibits in classes 1-67 inclusive must be bona fide exhibitors own growing and in their possession at least two months before the Show.
- 2. No person shall be allowed more than one entry in each class.
- 3. Tomatoes shall be classed as Vegetables. Rhubarb classed as Fruit
- 4. Any exhibitor attempting to obtain any prizes by fraud shall forfeit all prizes awarded to them at the Show. All protests shall be made in writing to the Show Secretaries at the Show before 3.30pm on the day of the Show with a fee of £1 which shall be forfeited to the funds of the Society if the protest is not upheld.
- 5. Entries must be in on the form provided accompanied by the correct entry fee and sent or delivered to the Show Secretaries by Wednesday 30th August 2023 or in person at Claverton Down Community Hall between 6pm and 8pm on that date. NO ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER THIS DATE. Additional entry forms can be downloaded: www.clavertonhortsoc.org 6. Exhibits must be staged on the evening of the day immediately previous to the show between 6pm and 7pm or on the day of the show between 8.30am and 11am WHEN THE SHOW MARQUEE WILL BE CLEARED FOR JUDGING. Exhibitors are reminded that red stickers should be affixed to their exhibitors' cards if they do not wish these to be auctioned (children's classes will not be auctioned)
- 7. No exhibits or cards shall be removed until after the presentation of awards, except by specific permission of the Show Secretary.
- 8. No responsibility will be accepted for loss of or damage to any exhibit or other personal property.
- 9. All horticultural exhibits will be judged according to RHS Rules, and in Particular Rule 4 i.e. only one entry per household per class. Other exhibits restricted to one per person.
- 10. Where there are 5 or fewer exhibits in any one class, prizes may be restricted at the discretion of the judges, but not necessarily in the children's classes.
- 11. Trophies will be presented at 4pm and money paid out immediately before the Auction. Prize moneys not claimed by 10th Sept 2023 from the Treasurer shall be deemed to be forfeited to the funds of the Society.
- 12. Exhibitors Cards <u>must</u> be placed so that <u>Exhibitor's number is face down on the table.</u> If a card is omitted the entry will not be judged.
- 13. The decision of the Chairman of the Show Executive committee shall be final and binding on all exhibitors.
- 14. Competitors in all classes are requested to state on the back of the exhibitors card the variety exhibited.
